Mrs. Talbert said from her youth she was taught to take responsibility for serving her community.

"You don't sit back and ask," the new City Council member said. "You get up and do."

When a few people in town run for a council seat, she spent a lot of time seeking the advice of friends and family, especially husband, her she said. The longtime community volunteer -- who works for Lori Graham CPA, P.C. -- eventually decided to seek a seat on the council, which Mrs. Talbert described "an all-encompassing position" that ties together many city issues important to

Lampasas has reached a 'pivotal point," Mrs. Talbert said, as she believes the city has growth potential and a council -- with a good mix of experience, youth and vision - ready to move forward in

addressing the town's needs. Talbert Mrs. Lampasans' quality of life is her primary focus, and she said economic growth plays a key role in providing residents with the amenities they expect. The city, she said, needs an increase in jobs and businesses to provide more revenue for services without an increase in property taxes.

At the same time, Mrs. Talbert said it is important that Lampasas maintain its "small-town values" remain a place where people feel connected to their community.

To plan for Lampasas' future, Mrs. Talbert said, City Council members should listen with an open mind to other projects. residents to understand what people think are the town's greatest needs.
