Mr. Meyerowitz was born Dec. 24, 1935 in Austin to Louis and Selma Meyerowitz.


He married Suzanne L. Meyerowitz on May 4, 1969 in Seguin.

# Police officers, Lampasas resident get special recognition

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letters -- all in favor of changing the zoning to SF-6. The Planning & Zoning Commission unanimously recommended the council approve the request.

In another matter, the council unanimously approved the installation of Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition equipment at the sewage lift station on FM 580 East, just past the Key Avenue intersection. The cost of labor, materials, programming and installation is \$25,250 through Trac-N-Trol, the city's SCADA system contractor.

SCADA provides automated monitoring of the city's water and wastewater operations. For example, Water/Wastewater Operations Manager Van Sims said SCADA monitors the power at lift stations, checks whether the stations' pumps are on and tracks the pumps' running time. SCADA also monitors how high the sewage level is at a lift station, and the automated system alerts the city staff if the level is too high.
Also at Monday's council

meeting, a new police officer and a longtime Lampasas police investigator received special recognition.

Baker, who has received his certification as a police officer, took the oath of office, administered by Municipal Court Judge Robert Gradel. After that, Chief of Police

Sammy Bailey recognized Sgt. Investigator Tim Ryan for graduating from the Leadership Command College at the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas.

Ryan is the police department's fifth LEMIT graduate, as Ms. Bailey, Assistant Chief of Police Jody Cummings, Code Enforcement Officer Sgt. Tony Barrio and the late Chief of Police L.D. Bender also completed leadership training with the institute. Other special recognition at the council meeting went to Joe Corcoran, whom Mayor Misti Talbert named a "Community Champion."

Mrs. Talbert created the Community Champion program to honor those who serve the community and enhance Lampasas' quality of life. Corcoran and his wife,

Maricela, relocated to Lampasas in 2011 and live on East Second Street in the former post office, which they renovated.

# City seeks legal counsel's advice about phone, internet outages

This marked the third outage in less than two months that disrupted telecommunications for hours during the business day. Like the ones that occurred in late May and late June, Tuesday's outage was blamed on a fiber optic line that was cut somewhere south of Lampasas.

Service returned sporadically for some local customers during the sixand-a-half-hour outage that DeGraffenried mentioned.

The Burnet County
Sheriff's Office made a post
to Facebook around 2:40
p.m. Tuesday regarding
the outage. As in Lampasas
County, 911 calls were
rerouted to surrounding
agencies, and dispatchers
maintained communication
with the other dispatch

centers and deputies via radio.

DeGraffenried said he has a call in to the city of Lampasas' legal counsel to find out what agency has jurisdiction over this issue and what pressure can be put on the entities at fault for causing the outage. When he was interviewed Wednesday, DeGraffenried was not sure who was responsible for Tuesday's disruption

in telecommunications

service.
"It is a significant issue for our local business as well as our emergency services," the city manager

said.
"The city itself is certainly looking into what pressure can be brought to bear on [whoever is responsible], 'cause this is just unacceptable to have three outages in basically six weeks," he added.
