Fire destroys home near Kempner

Multiple agencies respond to blaze Monday on FM 2313

A fire of an unknown cause destroyed a house north of Kempner Monday evening.

A passing motorist reported the blaze in the 3700 block of FM 2313, about three miles from Kempner.

Smoke could be seen for miles away.

Kempner Volunteer Fire Department was dispatched at 6 p.m. Additional help was sought from the Lampasas Fire Department and Lometa Volunteer Fire Department a short time later.

Lampasas Fire Chief Reece Oestreich served as incident commander.

"It's a total loss," said Lampasas Fire Marshal Ronnie Withers of the one-story residence. The native stone and brick house also had Hardie board siding. Withers is continuing an

investigation into the fire. No one was home at the time of the blaze, but there were belongings in the house, the fire marshal said. There were no pets in the house, he

Eighteen firefighters battled the blaze, which was brought under control about 7:30 p.m. Firefighters were on the scene until shortly before 11 p.m.

When fire personnel arrived, the structure was engulfed in flames.

A "defensive attack" was ordered. No firefighters went inside, and all firefighting was from the exterior, Withers

"It was not safe for anyone to go in," he said. In an interview Wednesday

City Council votes to pave trails within Campbell Park

The Lampasas City Council voted Monday to award a contract for construction of concrete trails through the Hanna Springs Sculpture Garden at Campbell Park.

The trails will replace the park's existing gravel paths, providing smooth sidewalks for people to use when looking at the sculptures.

Concrete sidewalks also are intended to allow for parks department vehicle traffic during maintenance work, according to Parks and Recreation Director Chris Eicher.

The council voted 6-0, with council member TJ Monroe absent from the meeting, to award the trail installation project to Canales-Dibble Construction Inc. The Lampasas company will install about a half-mile of 5-foot-wide concrete trails for \$60,620.

The city received four bids, and one was lower than the amount Canales-Dibble offered. ASJ Construction of Lampasas bid \$58,610.

Although Canales-Dibble's bid was not the lowest, the procurement method the

city used allows officials to consider which company will provide the overall "best value" to the city.

Eicher said after contacting references, city staff decided to recommend awarding the project to Canales-Dibble. Eicher cited the company's "quality of work and relationship and job history" with the city as reasons for the recommen-

dation. Canales-Dibble expects to begin its work in Campbell Park very soon, barring inclement weather, Eicher said. The installation should take about three weeks, the parks director said.

In other business, the council voted 6-0 to leave telecommunications right of way access line rates unchanged.

The city could have increased rates about 1 percent due to inflation, but City Manager Finley deGraffenried said telecommunications companies ass the charge on to their landline customers.

To keep customers from facing a higher fee because of the line charge, the council has voted in the past to leave rates unchanged, deGraffenried said.

The city manager said Lampasas' revenue from the right of way access line rates continues to decrease as fewer people use landlines. The city received \$51,807 in the 2017 fiscal year. In the 2016 fiscal year, the revenue

was \$54,977. On another item, the council voted 6-0 to replace Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system equipment at four lift stations. The SCADA system provides automated control and monitoring of water flow, pressure, tank levels, disinfectant and other items related to the

Lometa school board approves list of staff members who may carry concealed guns

After an executive session Monday that lasted roughly 20 minutes, the Lometa Independent School District Board of Trustees unanimously approved a list of 10 staff members who will be permitted to

carry firearms on campus. While the district will not release the names of those employees for safety reasons, Superintendent David Fisher said only those who volunteered to carry and already have a License to Carry through the state of Texas will be allowed to do so. Staff members who are uncomfortable carrying firearms will not have that responsibility.

Even with a License to Carry, staff will be expected to complete additional training, according to Lometa ISD policy.

"They need to have training and after a plan is set up, that will be instituted,' Fisher said. "We will have at least an annual training component.

Fisher told the Dispatch Record in February that he had halted a concealedcarry proposal for the district until teachers had received proper training. But after recent school shootings in Parkland, Florida, the superintendent believed it was time to act quickly to prepare teachers.

The approved staff members will not be permitted to carry firearms until a security plan is developed and instituted, which "we'll be working on in the next couple of weeks," Fisher said.

Open carry of weapons still will be
