

Pool season is here

A busy summer is in store for city pools, after they opened last weekend.

Regular hours for Hanna Springs are Tuesday through Saturday noon to 7 p.m. and 1-6 p.m. on Sundays. Hancock Springs Free-Flow Swim Area is open Thursday through Saturday noon to 7 p.m., and Sunday 1-6 p.m.

Season passes are offered at \$60 for individuals and \$125 for a family. Children under nine must be accompanied by an adult.

Special events offered by the city include a series of Moonlight Swims at Hancock Springs Free-Flow Swim Area, swim lessons at the Hanna Springs pool and water aerobics.

Water aerobics are offered Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7-8 p.m. June 5 to Aug. 30. The cost is \$40 for eight classes.

Swim lessons are available in three series:

- Session 1: June 12-June 22
- Session 2: June 26-July 6
- Session 3: July 17-27

Group classes are \$50 per session, with eight classes per session. Private classes are \$65 per session, with four classes per session.

Lessons will be offered for several skill levels.

- preschool level: teaches basics and water safety.

- Level 1: teaches basics, working toward forward movement and floating.

- Level 2: puts the fundamentals together, gaining forward movement and teaching different methods.

- Level 3: swimmers will learn diving and treading water.

- Level 4: lessons will focus on higher endurance, technique and perfecting diving.

Moonlight swims are planned June 30 and July 28 at Hancock Springs Free-Flow Swim Area. Timed around the full moon, these events offer night-time swimming, music provided by a DJ, plus a potluck supper.

Pool hours may vary July 9-15 during Spring Ho week. Spring Ho water sports, including a cardboard regatta, are set for July 14.

The Hancock Springs pool remains one of the few natural, spring-fed pools in Texas. A famous counterpart in West Texas – Balmorhea State Park pool – is closed indefinitely due to concrete damage, making Hancock Springs the prime destination for a cold, summer swim.

A.C. January Memorial tournament

Past winners edged out in competitive championship flight

Will Griffin won his first title in the A.C. January Memorial golf tournament on Monday, taking the lead in the last round of the 54-hole event.

Griffin, a former Texas Tech University player, shot 67-68-67—202 to win the tournament by two strokes. Bear Courtney, the 2010 champion, and Justin Schulze – a seven-time winner – carded 204 to tie for second overall.

Temperatures peaked at 96 degrees on Saturday and 94 the next two days. Those temperatures made for the hottest A.C. January Memorial tournament since 2011.

Griffin's score of 202 was one stroke higher than the winning score posted last year by Drew Dewald. Dewald finished fifth overall this year, shooting a 208.

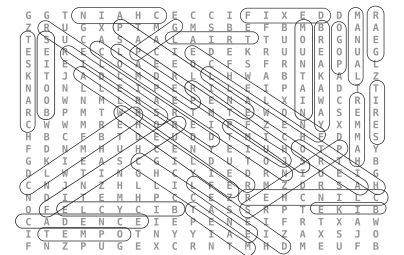
