YEAR IN REVIEW

2019 sees growth; sports legend dies, and new ones emerge

look back at the news of 2019 offers a quick summary of what transpired across the county this year in subjects ranging from sports to construction to business.

RECORD PERFORMANCES

Athletic accomplishments by Lampasas High School teams bookmarked what many residents recall as the best stories of 2019.

From the Lady Badgers' basketball playoff run to the track medals earned by Badger athletes at the state meet to the record-setting season in football, these standout performances played a big role in drawing the community together this year and fueling Lampasans' excitement about their town.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

Subdivision development and proposals for revitalization also made for big news this year.

Work continued on the Stone Valley subdivision off Nix Road in west Lampasas. Deorald Finney proposed the development more than 10 years ago, but after a collapse in the housing market in 2008, he postponed the filing of the final plat for his 67-residence subdivision until 2018.

Paving of new roads Stone Valley Drive (off Nix Road), Fieldstone Drive (which is an extension of Rice Street) and Sandstone Cove in the interior of the subdivision was completed in the spring. Drainage and infrastructure issues have been addressed. and home building is proceeding in earnest.

An incentive agreement Finney signed with the city requires him to complete at least 50% of the 67 proposed

nouses within rive years. Last Friday, Finney said he has built 13 Stone Valley houses, and sold five since October. He said he plans to build at least 10 more Stone Valley houses in 2020 -- and

"hopefully a lot more." Developers Steven McDonald and Chris Harrison of S2M2 Inc. have worked out terms for a residential neighborhood they plan to construct in east Lampasas.

Brodie Estates will offer 22 lots south of the intersection of Brown and Cloud streets. Two new streets – to be named Elijah Lane and Blain Circle - will be cul-desacs that connect to Brown.

The city's economic incentive package for this development requires S2M2 to complete the Brodie Estates subdivision within four years.

While these subdivisions proceed within the Lampasas city limits, another area of

residential development has garnered approval in the east end of the county.

The River Place subdivision northwest of Kempner is set to expand, as the Lampasas County Commissioners Court approved the Phase II preliminary plat in May. The development off FM 2313 will offer 91 residential lots.

And 2019 brought completion of the city's new Council Chambers/Municipal Court facility, as an open house was held Dec. 16 to show off the community meeting place. In a dedication ceremony, the renovated 1931 structure at 302 E. Third St. was named the Jack Calvert Municipal Building.

The most extensive building project for the county - the new jail and law enforcement center on Barnes Street – is expected to reach completion in early 2020.

Groundbreaking took place in April 2018, and the new jail is projected to open in February. Sheriff Jess Ramos offered county justices of the peace and other officials a tour of the facility in November.

In other news, officials unanimously rejected a public improvement district proposal in August that would have brought a nature resort and housing development on 3,200 acres on the west side of the county.

TALA Resorts Inc. had proposed the creation of a fivestar wilderness resort, plus 250-300 custom homesites on

Jackson Ranch property that stretches from FM 580 West near Nix to the Colorado River. The public improvement district designation would have allowed bond financing in the county's name to fund infrastructure expenses for the project.

The Lampasas County Commissioners Court rejected the PID after receiving

extensive public testimony. TALA Resorts had

estimated the project would have created 173 fulltime jobs and brought \$2.6 million in property tax revenue to the county annually. County residents and

commissioners, however, voiced concerns about the 1 million gallons of water per day that would be needed for the development, how sewage waste would be discharged, and what the effects would be on the Hill

Country environment.

BUSINESS NEWS

The Market Place at Sulphur Creek is a 36,000-square-foot development that is expected to

BURN BAN AND FIREWORKS

A countywide burn ban is in effect, prohibiting outdoor fires outside incorporated city limits. A violation of the burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

Also, the Lampasas County Commissioners Court has prohibited the sale or use of fireworks classified as "skyrockets with sticks" or "missiles with fins" outside incorporated city limits.

The prohibition will end at 12:01 a.m. on Jan. 2 or when the Texas **A&M Forest Service determines** drought conditions no longer exist in the county -- whichever is earlier. A violation of the fireworks order

is a Class C misdemeanor.

COMMISSIONERS COURT

In a called meeting Monday, the Lampasas County Commissioners Court approved a series of private road numbers.
