Doctor, AdventHealth Rollins Brook official urge public to vaccinate against COVID-19 as Lampasas health facilities see surge of patients

ast week, family medicine physician Dr. James Cain saw 61 patients in one day — the highest daily count he's had in his 23 years of practice. Now, those high numbers

are an everyday occurrence. Cain practices out of AdventHealth Central Texas Family Medicine Clinic-Lampasas.

Both Cain and Ashley Underwood, AdventHealth **Rollins Brook vice** president/administrator, say they've seen a record number of patients at the clinic and at the hospital.

The culprit? Cain and Underwood say it's the rising COVID-19 cases.

Two months ago, the United States entered its third coronavirus surge driven by the highly transmissible delta variant,

and that has affected mostly unvaccinated people, including dozens of Lampasans.

Cain and Underwood say in some ways, this phase has been the hardest yet.

The number of coronavirus patients has decreased slightly in the latest reports, but active cases remained above the 300 mark this week.

Lampasas County releases its coronavirus reports every four days.

As of Sept 19, the numbers showed 352 active cases, a decrease of 74 since Sept. 14. The death toll was at 50, and 7,670 residents reported to be fully vaccinated – an increase of 40 since Sept. 14.

AdventHealth Rollins Brook has seen a 39.7% positivity rate among residents who have been tested, the highest the county has experienced since the pandemic first hit in March 2020. Hospital representatives also confirm a shortage of


beds and say the number of occupied beds fluctuates daily. The Rollins Brook facility has 24 beds in total.

Earlier this summer, it appeared the widespread availability of vaccines might mean the coronavirus pandemic was behind them. But Cain and Underwood say their medical staffers share a hardening view toward the delta variant's biggest target: the willingly unprotected.

Underwood said 95% of the county's hospitalizations are the unvaccinated.

Underwood said staff work more than 15-hour shifts every day, with some aiding in the transport of patients to nearby hospitals due to a shortage of beds. Doctors

On Sept. 16, more than 30 residents attended a town hall that gave an overview of the proposed updates. Among those in the audience were tradesmen, contractors and real estate representatives.

also provide power.

Updated building codes will affect both commercial and residential structures.

One concern expressed at the town hall was the economic effect of new codes, as the cost to build a home has increased substantially in the last two years.

According to the Texas Home Builders Association, the average cost to build a new home is around \$114 per square foot. This estimate tracks with national norms, as well.

On the materials side, lumber prices reached record highs this year, spiking 67% in 2021, up 340% from pre-pandemic levels.

Nationally, lumber costs alone have added \$35,872 to the price of a typical new-construction, single-family home.

Lampasas Building Official Frank Ellett told the audience at Thursday's town hall that his department's goal is to not bring unnecessary costs to builders or buyers.

Holding a town hall is one of six steps in the process before a formal adoption of new building codes can take place.

City Secretary Becky Sims, who also serves as the city's zoning administrator, said the department will compile feedback before any additional consideration is brought to the City Council.
